#### **IMMEDIATE PAST MAYOR - REFLECTING ON THE PAST**

There are many highlights but the one that will have the biggest impact on the town is closing the deal with NNC to acquire Fletton Field. Although the legal transfer of the land has yet to be completed it is now a question of when and not if it joins the council's property portfolio. Alongside this we decided to bring our Open Space team and their equipment to our Fletton House complex thereby ending their dependence on rented facilities.



The council was delighted to commemorate the 80th Anniversary of D Day by hosting the Yarn Bombers' extraordinary contribution to this at the Hub. Their Pegasus Bridge replete with piper was appreciated by his son as guest of honour, the Deputy Lord Lieutenant, members of the British Legion and other visitors, viewers of Look East and listeners to Radio Northampton. Thanks too to the British Legion for Remembrance Day at the War Memorial and thereafter at St Peters. Laying the wreath on behalf of the town is always a great honour. Another event hosted at the Hub was the county Young Enterprise awards. Congratulation to the worthy winners, Northampton Girls School.


- · Manages open spaces & some grass verges

- Consults on planning applications



#### **FINANCE**

Oundle Town Council (OTC) manages significant amounts of ratepayer money: the Finance & General Purposes committee (F&GP) takes its responsibility for financial management and policy and strategic matters very seriously.

We have one of the highest local rates in the county, for two main reasons: firstly, because we own one of the largest property portfolios in the county, including the QVH, the Courthouse, Fletton House, and the Joan Strong centre; and secondly because we have wider responsibilities for local amenities such as the cemetery, compared to other local councils.





# **HEAD OF ESTATES**

Oundle Town Council is responsible for a diverse and extensive property portfolio, including a number of buildings (comprising the QVH, Fletton House, free toilets and the Courthouse) and open spaces (including Snipe Meadow, the Rec, three free car parks and the cemetery) important to the fabric of our town. Our maintenance budget not only covers our team of two in the Estates department and regular maintenance (from grass cutting and safety checks on playgrounds, to work on the offices we rent out to small businesses), but also significant planned and unplanned repair work - the recent work on the walls of the St Peters churchyard is a case in point, costing over £50,000. We hope to adopt environmentally appropriate practices where we can - from a broad adoption of recycled plastics for outdoor furniture, to grazing Snipe Meadow with local cattle – and to enhance how we manage our estate – upgrading the toilets, extending the use of the cemetery as effectively as we can (something that is very unusual for a council of our size), and adapting our car parks to greater demand.

## **HEAD OF PLANNING**

#### **PLANNING REVIEW 2023/4**

The planning committee considered 74 applications from May last year to April this year of which 12 were for listed building consent. We had presentations from (amongst others) the applicants seeking outline permission for 14 dwellings on Miller's Field, Benefield Road; McCarthy Stone seeking permission for 42 retirement living apartments on Herne Road and Oundle School in connection with its application for a 60 bed girls' boarding house on the site of the former primary school in Milton Road. Amongst the other applications considered were those in respect of the new Sports Hall at Prince William School, the residential re-development of Dairy Farm Stoke Doyle Road for 9 dwellings and new retail units on land off West Street (formerly Seven Wells/Johnsons).

We also considered the Local Plan Part 2 proposed modifications consultation and the consultation on the North Northamptonshire Gypsy and Travellers Local Plan.

Oundle Town Council holds the market rights and manages the weekly Thursday market, the monthly Farmers' Market, the Christmas Market, and, more recently, the Food Festival.

With their diverse offerings, vibrant atmosphere, and commitment to community and sustainability, the markets are more than just a place to buy and sell goods – they are a celebration of everything that makes Oundle unique. # **EXPLORING SNIPE MEADOW:**A HIDDEN GEM IN OUNDLE

Snipe Meadow Pocket Park, situated on the banks of the River Nene north of Oundle Wharf, is a very important



site for protecting endangered Snipe and Redshank. Snipe Meadow has County Wildlife Site Status and contains true mire. Special Wildlife Snipe, Redshank and other wading birds. Barn Owl, Sedge Warbler, Reed Warbler, Reed Bunting. Tufted Sedge (Carex elata), Marsh Marigold, Meadow Rue, Meadowsweet and a wide range of dragonflies and damselflies also call it home.

In the summer months local
Dexter Cows stay on Snipe
Meadow grazing on the lush
vegetation providing an
alternative to mowing which



creates a variety of vegetation at different heights, with small areas of bare ground. This is beneficial for a wide range of wildlife in different habitats, and it allows wildflowers to grow, flower and set seed each year.

Snipe Meadow is not just for the wildlife enthusiast. It offers a range of activities that allow visitors to immerse themselves in nature. Well-marked trails make it easy for hikers and walkers to explore the area. These paths meander through different parts of the meadow, providing scenic views and opportunities to observe wildlife up close.

# OUNDLE COMMUNITY BUS TRIAL: ENHANCING LOCAL CONNECTIVITY

This year we welcomed North Northamptonshire Council's (NNC) bus trial in Oundle with regular trips organised to Rushden Lakes picking up in Oundle, Warmington and Barnwell. Trips are free with your bus pass or £4 for a round trip offering locals an affordable day trip they wouldn't normally take.

Oundle Town Council Hub Manager, Morag Horsnail, has worked with bus contractor Ka from Commibus to promote new trips and take bookings, and so far the feedback has been very positive.

Those who have taken the trip have said it's a welcome addition to the town and would be interested in trips elsewhere, such as Stamford. We will continue to work with NNC promoting and booking the bus trips and forwarding your feedback to them.


